Over the last 20 plus years John has collected over \$20,000 in cans and bottles and provided over 40 scholarships to Canandaigua Academy students. The last 2 years John has provided 3 - \$500 scholarships through his hands on hard work. John Thompson is a great example of the Rotary motto, 'Service Above Self' and the 4-Way Test.
